WEtransFORM
On the Future of Building
6 June 2025 – 25 January 2026

The Bundeskunsthalle has designated 2025 the year of sustainability and ecological change. Central to the programme is an international exhibition and networking project on sustainable architecture and urban development in Europe.

The exhibition invites visitors to take an active interest in the future of our built environment. The focus is on fundamental design principles for a climate-friendly renewal of our building culture. These include, in particular, topics on climate resilience, biodiversity, sufficiency, revitalization, circular economy as well as experimenting and taking action.

On display are around 80 projects that deal with the challenges of climate change in an exemplary manner. The Haus Glasner in the Ahrtal (Ahr valley), for example, attempts to protect against future flooding and the Rambla Climate House against drought in Spain. The use of natural materials such as rammed earth (Anna Heringer) or wood (Hermann Kaufmann) can certainly be seen as an answer to the philosophical question of what is essential. The renovation of an old barn by Studio Bua in Iceland and the conversion of the former World Trade Center in Brussels by 51N4E reduce resource consumption, CO2 emissions and construction waste. Innovative research projects such as the NEST UMAR from the Karlsruhe Institute of Technology or the Hybrid Flax Pavilion from the University of Stuttgart explore new possibilities in dealing with circular material cycles or computer-based construction methods.

The highlight presented on the Museum Square is *Vert* - a green wooden beam construction by Diez Office/ OMC°C/AHEC that helps to cool squares and strengthen biodiversity in urban environments. The foyer of the Bundeskunsthalle is dominated by the ceilinghigh installation *Tree.ONE* by EcoLogicStudio (Claudia Pasquero/Marco Poletto) – a synthetic tree grown from microalgae that absorbs CO2 from the atmosphere and converts it into biomaterial.

For the exhibition design, the architecture firm MVRDV (Rotterdam) drew almost exclusively on existing materials in the Bundeskunsthalle.

The exhibition opening will be accompanied by a two-day festival on Friday/Saturday, June 6/7, 2025 in cooperation with the New European Bauhaus of the European Commission.

#### **Exhibition Texts**

#### SUSTAINABLE BUILDING?

Our planet's environmental problems are actually quite easy to understand: our Spaceship Earth can be thought of as a closed system. The resources on board are limited. If we consume too many resources, emit too many greenhouse gases and produce too much waste, sooner or later the balance inside the spaceship will tip. Living conditions will deteriorate, and more and more species will become extinct. This is why we must use what we have wisely, taking care to preserve the natural foundations of life so that future generations can live healthy and happy lives. It's really guite simple, isn't it?

Architecture and urban development play an important role in this context: the building sector is responsible for a significant proportion of resource consumption, greenhouse gas emissions and waste production. As a result, architects and urban planners are increasingly beginning to question their practices and to develop sustainable methods for building within the planetary limits.

Against this background, the exhibition at the Bundeskunsthalle presents around 80 projects in Europe that are committed to sustainable architecture and urban development. The curatorial concept aims to cover a broad spectrum of different approaches and methods. This is also because no one can say with certainty today what will actually prove to be sustainable in 30 years' time. What is needed is a plurality of building practices alongside ongoing discussion about them. The thematic clusters defined for the exhibition do not represent strict categories. Rather, they convey the fundamental design principles of sustainable building in the present through exemplary projects that encourage a broader dialogue.

For pragmatic reasons, the selection of projects is focused on Europe. Climate change is undoubtedly a global challenge whose impact will be felt largely in Asia, Africa and the Americas. But this does not mean that Europe has no role to play. On the contrary, the European Green Deal of 2020 has set the ambitious goal of making Europe the first climate-neutral continent by 2050. This is accompanied by a whole range of political regulations and economic options that present Europe as both a formable space for action and a capable actor on the world stage.

#### STRENGTHEN CLIMATE RESILIENCE!

The consequences of ongoing climate change are no longer abstract projections for the future, but concrete everyday realities, including in Europe. Temperatures are rising and more and more regions are facing drought, heat and fires. At the same time, storms, rainfall and floods are increasing. Rising water levels are exacerbating soil erosion in coastal areas. All this has far-reaching consequences for the habitats of people, animals and plants – and therefore for the demands placed on the built environment.

Architecture and urban development are responding to these developments with a variety of measures, both large and small. For example, unsealing asphalted surfaces facilitates the seepage of rainwater. The greening of streets and squares provides shade and improves the microclimate. Floodplains and underground reservoirs use rainfall to compensate for long dry spells. Floating office buildings adapt to changing water levels. Proactive measures help to improve quality of life, minimise risks and prevent disasters.

#### PROMOTE BIODIVERSITY!

In addition to its benefits for the wellbeing and health of residents, the greening of urban living spaces plays an important role in enhancing biodiversity and the self-regulation of ecosystems. Balconies, gardens and parks, as well as wasteland, medians and railway lines are valuable, often diverse biotopes for a wide variety of life forms. Insects, animals and plants find suitable living conditions here.

As a result, experts from the fields of architecture, design, art, horticulture, landscaping and the natural sciences are working together to enhance the natural biodiversity of our cities and facilitate the coexistence of species. Ecological knowledge, creative design and aesthetic sensitivity go hand in hand.

#### PRACTICE CONTENTMENT!

What do we really need? And what could we easily do without? Wouldn't focusing on the essentials perhaps even make us happier? This question has a philosophical dimension, but it also arises in everyday life for very practical reasons: reducing global resource consumption is a matter of urgency.

In this context, sufficiency is understood as a question of right measure. Not everything that seems convenient today is really useful. This applies to personal needs as well as to technical solutions and legal regulations.

With this in mind, it is important to take a critical look at our building practices: how can we use existing resources more efficiently? Where can we dispense with high-tech options and achieve satisfactory results with low-tech solutions? When is it better to use locally available building materials, such as wood or clay? Basically, there are endless opportunities to reduce our everyday consumption without being too restrictive.

#### REVITALISE THE EXISTING STOCK!

The European city is built. This sentence may seem provocative to many. After all, there is a shortage of living space, and the inhospitality of some urban neighbourhoods is hard to accept. The fact is, however, that the consumption of land and the sealing of soil cannot go on as before. At the same time, every time a building is demolished, an enormous amount of material and energy is wasted.

As a result, there is a growing demand to conserve existing buildings, adapt them to changing needs, consolidate usable space and optimise the utilisation concepts. The spectrum of measures ranges from the renovation and conversion of existing buildings to large-scale transformation processes covering entire areas and urban districts.

# **OPTIMISE CYCLES!**

Recycling old bricks, beams and windows has a long tradition. What was once done out of necessity is now enjoying renewed appreciation. In addition, models for the systematic recycling of resources and the optimisation of material cycles are being developed with academic rigour.

Cities are seen as repositories of raw materials in that the demolition or dismantling of existing buildings through urban mining can yield suitable resources for recycling. Entire research facilities are experimenting with the temporary storage of building materials and other valuable materials, such as metals, which can be broken down into their constituent parts and reassembled at the end of a life cycle. Recycled plastics form the basis of innovative façade elements.

It is not uncommon for the existing material to serve as the starting point for the further design process, thus having a decisive influence on the [building's] final appearance.

#### DARE TO EXPERIMENT!

While modern architecture in the 20th century was heavily influenced by materials from the Industrial Age, such as concrete, steel and glass, a new picture is emerging for the 21st century: the return to sustainable, climate-friendly building methods that operate in harmony with nature is filling research laboratories at design universities with all kinds of new materials, including algae, fungi and plant fibres. At the same time, technological innovations in digitalisation, robotics and 3D printing are enabling entirely new construction methods. Together, they create futuristic spaces in which the archaic longing for a protective shell meets the free play of forms made possible by computer-based design tools.

WEtransFORM. On the future of building

Thursday, August 28, 5–6 p.m.

This year, the Bundeskunsthalle Bonn is dedicating itself to ecological transformation. The focus is on *WEtransFORM*, an international exhibition and networking project on sustainable architecture and urban development in Europe.



Based on the ideas and approaches of the historic Bauhaus in the first half of the 20th century, architecture and urban development are rethought against the backdrop of planetary boundaries and the effects of climate change. Resource consumption, extreme weather, ecosystems and habitats play just as much a role here as repurposing, up-cycling and the question of the right balance.

The exhibition presents innovative projects from all over Europe and encourages people to get active.

When calling culture! is aimed at people who, for various reasons, cannot visit museums or cannot visually grasp the content of a guided tour. transform.NRW – Symposium Shaping sustainability with art, culture and design Thursday, November 13 – Friday, November 14

The symposium brings together actors from the fields of art, culture and design with those from science and society to discuss key issues of sustainability transformation. The program includes workshop and lecture sessions, per-formative-musical elements, film screenings and thematically complementary exhibition tours in the Bundeskunsthalle.

The symposium is part of the 4-year joint project transform.NRW, a cooperation between the Wuppertal Institute and the University of Wuppertal with 14 partners from the fields of art, culture, design and science.



# **Current and Upcoming Exhibitions**

SUSAN SONTAG Seeing and Being Seen until 28 September 2025

Susan Sontag studied the nature and impact of visual media throughout her career. As early as 1977, having recognised the decisive influence of photography in our media-driven society, she published *On Photography*, her most widely read book, in which she argued that the act of taking a photograph is more than just passive observation. In view of the dramatic proliferation of photographs of war and atrocities in the wake of globalisation, she reiterated her warning against the dangers of apathy and visual numbness in her 2003 book *Regarding the Pain of Others*.

The exhibition Susan Sontag. Seeing and Being Seen focuses on her observations on photography and traces Sontag's theories and thoughts on the subject. It also explores her involvement with queer culture, her stance on the discrimination against people infected with HIV and her own struggle with cancer. Moreover, it shines a light on Sontag as a film enthusiast and director and portrays her as an independent woman who rebelled against society throughout her life.

PARA-MODERNISM Life Reform Movements From 1900 Onwards until 10 August 2025

Freedom! Shaking off the constraints of bourgeois life, capitalism and industrial society. This was the dream of a great many young people around 1900 – and they set about making it come true. Some of them embarked on a new life in reform colonies far away from urban areas. The desire for a peaceful existence in harmony with nature was at the heart of these ambitions, as were new ideas about health, physical culture and spirituality – a new attitude to life that went on to find expression in a new aesthetic.

In art and design, Art Nouveau and Expressionism introduced new creative ideas. The reform movement also found expression in everyday life: vegetarianism, the rejection of bourgeois marriage and traditional gender roles, nudism, alternative forms of education and, last but by no means least, the media, which were essential to the propagation of these new ideas. Where did these new paths lead and which ideas do we still recognise in today's zeitgeist? The exhibition sheds light on the ideals of the early life reform movements, but also examines individual reformers whose esoteric world view and idealisation of the 'healthy' body led them to embrace racist and nationalist ideologies. The exhibition is the first to look not only at the developments in Europe but also at the links to American counter-culture and the flower power movement.



INTERACTIONS X WETRANSFORM until 26 October 2025

Since 2023, the Bundeskunsthalle has organised a summer programme of interactions around the building. This year, *Interactions x WEtransFORM* reflects the theme year of sustainability in dialogue with playful installations: In addition to a project by La Fabrique Terrestre on the roof, two other positions represent visions for a more sustainable and future-oriented design of our environment: *Tree.ONE* by ecoLogicStudio in the foyer and the large wood and plant construction *Vert* by AHEC/Diez Office/OMC°C on the forecourt.

The new works also invite us to play, reflect or linger, such as the sound installation *RadiOh Europa* by Action or Jonas Brinker's *Nightfall*, a loving observation of fireflies. Yawei Chen's *Electronic Pets* explores how people in our rapidly evolving society use digital content for emotional comfort. Ina Weber's *Rubble Tracks-Mini Golf* and Dennis Fuchs's table tennis work *Back and Forth* playfully explore individual and collective competition and issues of equality and fairness.

Raul Walch's textile installation Carried by the Wind and Tomas Kleiner's Weather Birch also visualise the bridge between Interactions and WEtransFORM.

In the spirit of sustainable thinking, Jeppe Hein's water pavilion, *Circular Appearing Rooms*, Carsten Höller's *Bonn Slide* and works from last year, such as Temitayo Ogunbiyi's organic climbing frame, *You will follow the Rhein and compose play (playground)*, and Olaf Nicolai's football goal walls, *Camouflage/Torwand 1–3 [Croy, Kleff, Maier]*, will remain in place. The seesaws *Controversy Teeter-Totter* by Esra Gülmen and the high seats entitled *Meanwhile* by Linda Nadji will also be presented again.
